

he Microsoft Justice Reform Initiative has selected the Sarita and Claire Wright Lucas Foundation as one of 30 organizations across the country to participate in the Catalyst Grant Program. This program's intent is to help organizations like ours use data and technology to inform and improve practice within our communities to make the justice system more equitable. The organizations chosen will launch projects using data and technology to advance local justice reform.

Using this grant funding and resources, SCWLF's Massachusetts based project "The More Than 1%" **Initiative** Making the Case for More Black Women Prosecutors" will foster understanding of the importance of diversity in prosecution with a focus on the Greater Boston community. Our work will center on data collection by polling Black women law and pre-law students in Boston area colleges, law schools, and community organizations on their perceptions of the role of prosecutors in the justice system. We seek to understand why there are so few Black women prosecutors. Funding will also support education and outreach, using technology and social media to evaluate and disseminate the outcomes of our polling, as well as highlighting the importance of diversity and inclusion in prosecutorial offices, in a multimedia campaign.

Emerging Leaders: Our 2022 Awardees

Inspired by the life of her late daughter Sarita Wright Lucas and unborn granddaughter Claire, Wanda Geer along with friends and family created the Sarita & Claire Wright Lucas Foundation. By witnessing Sarita follow her dreams in the prosecution office, Wanda had special insight into the trials and tribulations that women of color face in the field of prosecution. She was inspired by Sarita's dedication to helping victims and passion for "doing the right thing", Sarita's willingness to make sacrifices, and outright tenacity in a field largely untouched by women of color. The Sarita and Claire Wright Lucas Foundation is a labor of love dedicated to supporting women of color like Sarita who are trying to make a difference.

SCHOLARSHIP AWARDEES

While many are aware of the debt that accumulates due to law school, what is not so well known is the need for additional funds to prepare for the Bar exam. In addition to the cost of a prep course – at about \$5,000 – many recent graduates must take out personal loans to cover living expenses as they take on the full-time, unpaid work of preparing for the exam.

The SCWLF awards scholarships to Black female law students who have committed to careers as prosecutors. For these future prosecutors, the Scholarship program covers the cost of the bar application and preparation up to \$5,000. The Scholarship program also offers a \$5,000 incentive for scholarship recipients who secure employment as prosecutors.

FELLOWSHIP AWARDEES

Our Fellowship Program, which launched in summer 2021, gives Black female law students the opportunity of a paid summer internship with the Massachusetts Suffolk and Middlesex District Attorney's offices. The Program aims to ensure that young female Black law students from all backgrounds are able to gain meaningful experience in public interest law. Interns will receive substantive work in the Attorney's offices, supervision, skills development, mentorship opportunities, and a \$7,000 stipend.

BIANCA JEANNE PICKERING

Candidate for Juris Doctorate J.D. May 2022 Northeastern School of Law

Bianca was extremely involved during her time at NEU: she was the Social Chair for the Black Law Students Association Kemet Chapter, the Associate Editor for the Northeastern University Law Review, the Public Relations Manager for the NAACP, and henceforth contributed tremendously to her school community. Bianca also completed three law internships from 2020 to 2021: she was a Juvenile Justice Unit Certified Legal Intern at the Philadelphia District Attorney's Office, an Education Policy Legal Intern at the Center for Popular Democracy in Brooklyn, New York, and a Policy Intern at the New York City Commission on Human Rights.



My career role model is my mother and Sojourner Truth. When I graduated college in 2018, I was honored with the Sojourner Truth award, While honored, I did not grasp the magnitude of the honor until I went to law school. Sojourner Truth is one of the fiercest civil rights activists in history, the first Black woman to sue a White man and prevail. The law is not written for Black people, especially Black women, so to compel a court to respect your rights especially in that time period is an unmissable feat. She embodied strength, bravery, courage, and most of all, audacity.






BRITTANY STOKES

A dedicated and hard-working self-starter, Brittany completed five law internships from 2016 to 2021: she was a Clerical Assistant for the First Judicial District of Pennsylvania, a Legal Intern for the Delaware County District Attorney's Office in Media, Pennsylvania, a Virtual Judicial Intern for the Honorable Timika Lane, Philadelphia Court of Common Pleas, a Legislative Intern for the 191st Legislative District in Philadelphia, and an Intern for the Office of the District Attorney in Philadelphia.

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Black women are underrepresented in the field of prosecution. It is an honor to join the profession and help bridge the gap. I look forward to crushing stereotypes about criminal prosecution and facilitating trust in the justice system. She was also an Intern Investigator for the Public Defender Service in Washington, D.C, and was a Victim Witness Advocate for the District and Superior Court.


We are thankful that our mission of equity and inclusion in prosecutorial offices resonates with so many.


